




























# Emma Helyer

# Jonathan Creed

After leaving Secondary school I began working in the book trade in Oxford in various independent bookshops, moving from one to another to gain promotion. During this time, I ran events in colleges and churches in and around Oxford.



In 1990 I left bookselling and went to University at Oxford Brookes to study for a BA Degree in Accounting & Finance and Retail Management, during this time I did write a manuscript but it was never published. Following graduation in 1994 I undertook a variety of temporary posts before returning to bookselling in Oxford. Where, with the support of my family, we started The Headington Bookshop. Sadly, the ceasing of the Net Book Agreement, which had fixed prices of books across the UK, resulted in my having to close the retail shop and continue only as a mail order business, which was eventually sold on as a going concern in 2000.

I choose to locate my first novel (A Sutherland Murder) in and around East Sutherland in an attempt to draw more people to this part of Scotland by raising the awareness of this beautiful county. While also allowing locals who may read them to recognise the areas described in the text. This title has been reprinted four times since then as has the second title (No Body at Ben Bhraggie) which was published six months later.

In 2022 I returned to the manuscript I had written in the 1990s, but had never been published, and spent a year rewriting it to 'fit' with the characters in the first two books into the third title. (Tunnel Under Threat). The fourth title, (The Rocks of Rogart) published this year, is the fourth in a series that has slowly continued to develop as I continue writing. My next book currently has the working title of (Hidden in Helmsdale).

His second novel, the first in a series, Aether Sphere released in 2021 to similar acclaim. (Also known as the manuscript rescued from the fire.) Book 2 is scheduled to release in 2024.

His third book, Kazimer the Cat, is an adorable story about cats being the supernatural protector for children during the night.

His love of literature and storytelling lead him to delve deep into the studies of not just literature, but history, mythology, and folk lore. (Also a focus of his podcast/vlog) He has delved deep into the nature of storytelling from novel, stage, and screen, to bring his own unique vision to the world of film, theatre, and literature.

# Margaret Mackay

Local writer, Margaret Mackay won the inaugural prize for a short story competition organised and administered by Perth College with her factual story '*The Kilns*' in which she



related the history of her home, previously a herring kiln. This competition is now an annual event.

Being a member of Caithness Writers she has had stories published in several of their anthologies: *Anthology of Caithness Crime, Beyond the Mist, Stacks, Flights of Imagination* and *Connections*. She attended Creative Writing classes at North Highland College where she wrote a play for radio, a stage play and a screenplay.

After the success of her first novel, *No More Secrets, No More Lies*, inspired by her visit to Malaysia, she has written other novels. Encouraged by George Gunn, who set his class an assignment to write a novella set in Caithness, Margaret began *Scarred*. However, in true Margaret Mackay style, she took her characters on a journey to other countries, sometimes exotic, sometimes with tragic consequences, and *Scarred* blossomed into a full length novel. December 2018 saw the release of her third novel *More Secrets*, the sequel to *No More Secrets, No More Lies*, and continued the mostly misfortunes of the characters introduced in her debut novel. Her fourth book, *Revelations*, will reveal the true consequences of the frailties and failings of her flawed characters and will surprise those avid followers of her heroes and heroines.
